# PRESENT SIMPLE

 <b>POSITIVE</b>	 <b>NEGATIVE</b>	<b>QUESTION</b> 
<p>I <b>sing</b>.</p> <p> He <b>sings</b>. She <b>sings</b>. It <b>sings</b>.</p>	<p>I <b>don't sing</b>.</p> <p> He <b>doesn't sing</b>. She <b>doesn't sing</b>. It <b>doesn't sing</b>.</p>	<p>Do I <b>sing</b>?</p> <p> Does he <b>sing</b>? Does she <b>sing</b>? Does it <b>sing</b>?</p>
